# Highway 1 Open! (part of it, anyway)

The new Pfeiffer Canyon Bridge is scheduled to open at the end of the day on Friday, October 13 –assuming there will be no issues involving weather, materials or equipment. Once open, there will be some weekdays that will require a lane closure consisting of oneway traffic control, but once the bridge opens, it won't need to fully close.

The section of Highway 1 north of Salmon to just south of Gorda remains closed due to the Mud Creek landslide. It is expected to remain closed until late summer 2018.

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## Streetmasters Cornering Workshop

As part of our BMW MOA Rally experience, we signed up for the Streetmasters 4-hour cornering workshop. We spent an hour or so in a classroom, learning about delay apex cornering (which most of you are probably familiar with). In case you aren't, the idea is to stay to the outside of the turn as late as possible in order to see further into the corner. This allows you to look for surprises in the corner and allows oncoming drivers the chance to see you sooner. It is quite simple on single corners, but gets more interesting on multi-turn combinations.

The rest of the time was spent on MSF-style parking lot drills. It is about turning as sharply as possible, and the main trick to that is to look through the turn, and resist the temptation to look right in front of the motorcycle. There was a brief braking exercise, and many laps of tight paths through little cones. The primary challenge was doing all this 5 mph riding in 90+ temperatures. We did have several water breaks. We were the only people doing the course 2-up. There was a wide variety of skill levels; I really envied the awesome skill shown by some of the participants. I think some of them could do Uturns on the sidewalk. The most exotic exercise was the technique used by motorcops to make a U-turn when they are two
