April Topic for Discussion: Traffic Light Sensors

President Steve suggested that we have a motorcycle-related topic for discussion at every club meeting. For April's meeting, Steve brought up the issue of traffic light sensors, and what to do (and what is legal), if your motorcycle cannot trip the light.

The California Vehicle Code does not allow for legally going through a red light if your vehicle does not trip it.

If a light is broken, you are required to stop fully and then proceed only when safe to do so according to regular right-of-way traffic laws.

However, CVC Section 21450.5(b) indicates that if there are traffic sensors, they must be installed and maintained so as to detect lawful bicycle or motorcycle traffic on the roadway. If the light cannot be tripped, can it be considered "broken"?

One approach to the frozen traffic light is to make a legal right turn (if possible), and then a (legal) U-turn. You could also try to trip the sensor by stopping the motorcycle wheels over the inductive loop in the pavement. Look for the saw-cuts in the pavement and place your wheels on the saw-cut. If there is a center cut use that one.

It is the aluminum in your wheels that acts like a conductive loop which acts like a shorted turn on a transformer to change the inductance of the loop of wire in the ground. A more permanent fix is to wrap a loop of 14 Ga copper wire around the perimeter of your boot. Solder the ends of the copper wire together to form the loop. (Wayne will make one for you if you ask.) Then you can place your foot on the saw-cut. You could also carry a loop in your side-case to use in case you get trapped in a parking garage.

Note: Magnets do not work, even the rare earth ones, nor does putting down your kickstand or turning your engine on and off. SANTA BARBARA BMW RIDERS NEWSLETTER

Coronado Trail Scenic Byway

Bob P. mentioned that he will be riding in Arizona and New Mexico in the next few weeks. One of the routes that he plans to ride is the Coronado Highway (US Highway 191) in Arizona. This route is about 119 miles and goes south-to-north from the copper-mining town of Clifton to the town of Springerville. The road reportedly has 460 curves, and it is one of the highest mountain roads in Arizona. The high point is 9,370 feet. It has sharp curves, steep drop-offs, and little or no shoulders-sounds like our kind of road! With an altitude change of about 6000 feet, it passes through several life zones.
