Member News and Rides

Technical Topic: Riding in the Rain By Steve

With the rainy season arriving, here is a list of tips for survival (or even enjoyment) of rain riding.

Most of us don't ride in the rain on purpose, but sometimes we are caught and need to adjust our skills for the conditions. We had a club member years ago who actually enjoyed riding in the rain and would seek out wet riding. Last I heard, he is living in Seattle area presumably optimizing his opportunities!

The most important tip for rain riding is staying dry! This seems obvious, but not always easy to accomplish while riding a motorcycle. Being dry helps you keep warm and allows you to focus more on your riding. Today's wet weather riding gear is much better than in the past; I have used Gore-Tex for over 20 years and it my favorite by far.

Visibility is critical, as sight distances drop in the rain. SOLAS reflective strips on bike and clothing are highly effective. Bright auxiliary lights are good for others to see you, but may not be great for your vision due to reflections from the moisture. Always position yourself on the road for best visibility.

Helmet visor fogging can be significant in wet weather and the pin-lock visor system can be quite effective at keeping visor clear. However, for those wearing glasses, it is still

not enough. I have used Rain-X for years on my visor and glasses; it negates the need for the pinlock system that adds another lens to look through. (less distortion over the field of view)

Wet road traction is typically 80% of dry. If you have ABS, it is amazingly effective in the wet. Next time you're in the wet, mash the brakes and marvel at how quickly you can stop. Buy tires that have water shedding tread and don't drop the pressure for "better traction" as we did with the old bias ply's. Beware of the slippery road film that arises with initial light rain.

Ride with a relaxed arm position on the bars and avoid sudden corrections as you might make when it's dry. Try to stay in tire tracks to optimize traction.

Finally, if there is significant diesel fuel on the wet road, you're probably going down. I have a friend who is an expert rider and he could not avoid crashing under these circumstances. My only advice here is to maintain good Karma!

Highway Updates

Highway 33: First, it was opened in mid-December (with five sections of one-way traffic control), then it was closed again on December 19! The heavy rains that occurred in December resulted in more road damage. No further word on when it will re-open again.

Highway 1: Caltrans has announced an estimated date for a full re-opening of Highway 1 will be late spring 2024.

Highway 1 remains closed at Limekiln State Park for northbound travelers; and for southbound travelers, closed 0.6 miles south of the town of Lucia.

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Chartered Club Camping at the National Rally

MOA dedicates an area for chartered club reserved group camping at the Rally site, including sign notification. Questions and site-reservation requests must go to Norm Wright, Co-Chair for Group Camping Sites. Reserving a site can include optional equipment rentals, which can be tents, walls, chairs or tables. Equipment rental requests must be made on the BMWMOA website and the deadline for rentals is March 15, 2024. Rental fees include the vendor setup and teardown fees. Clubs are responsible for any damage to the equipment.

In addition to making rental requests on the MOA website, please inform Norm Wright as to your Club Name, contact person info, and approximate number of attendees, to assure adequate ground space is reserved.

If your Club has its own canopies or tables, you may bring them. However, all canopy, tables and chairs that are rented must be reserved through the MOA website per agreement with the rally site vendor. Reserving Club Space or renting accessories does not include the Rally Attendee Fees, those must be procured separately on the MOA website.
