Northern California Backcountry Discovery Route

Backcountry Discovery Routes (BDR) has a new addition to its collection, the Northern California BDR. This route is nine sections covering 940 miles.

The northern route begins in Mammoth Lakes at Minaret Vista, an elevation of 9,265 feet. Most, if not all, of the route is more than a mile above sea level. It has optional advanced routes through the largest Jeffrey pine forest in the world, a second one around Obsidian Dome, and another with a technical water crossing with slick boulders. You can bypass any or all of these by sticking to the main route.

Other highlights of the route include Mount Patterson, the highest point of the route at 11,673 feet with a loose, rocky climb to get there with steep drop-offs. The paved sections are also great: Highway 89 goes over Monitor Pass at 8,314 feet to Highway 4, crossing Ebbets Pass at 9,186 feet to Bear Valley at the end of Section 2 (Bridgeport to Bear Valley).

The route goes along the Mokelumne River before crossing the Bear River Reservoir dam. An optional side trip takes you to the Leek Springs Hill Lookout Tower at 7,621 feet before continuing down the Mormon Emigrant Trail.

After leaving Kyburz, the route is on part of the Pony Express trail. A combination of paved, dirt, and two-track roads take you over Donner Pass. The last town in California is Alturas, 39 miles from the Oregon border.

With the addition of the Northern California BDR, you could ride all the way from the Mexican border to the Canadian Border on BDR routes.

The BDR site has information regarding each section, the distance, optional routes, lodging, camping, food, fuel and Discovery Points (geological, historical and otherwise interesting places to visit).

Warning: Very little motorcycle content, but should be of interest to travelers and adventurers.


Traveling to Cuba, for American citizens, is not quite as simple as going to many other foreign countries, but it's not that hard, either. Wayne and I signed up for a Cuban tour through OARS, an outdoor adventure company and one that we usually use for river rafting trips. This made it easy for us to figure out what documentation, visas and insurance we needed for the trip, and they provided bilingual tour guides, itineraries and reservations for the *casa particulars* (private guesthouses or hostels) for our group.

You can't just travel to Cuba as a "tourist"; as a US citizen, you must declare a travel category when you book flights and lodging. If you go with a travel company, they will provide the travel category. There are twelve categories of authorized Cuba travel, including educational activities, academic research, public performances, and humanitarian projects. Our trip was under the Support for the Cuban People category. This meant that we stayed at private guesthouses, ate at private restaurants, went to private homes and visited private businesses and museums. As US citizens, we were not allowed to support government-owned hotels,

We flew directly to Havana from Miami (several US airlines have direct flights), and met up with our guides. We stayed at a hostel in Old Havana and spent the next few days touring around the area.

restaurants or other businesses.

We noticed that there were many electric motorcycles and bicycles in Havana, and, of course, many American cars from the 1950's. Old Soviet Ladas were also common. The old American cars tended to be either in excellent shape, or in pretty bad shape. Once you get out of the cities, horse-drawn wagons and carts are very common.





One business that we visited in Havana was NostalgiCars. The owner restores old American cars and provides tour service. We got a ride in a 1958 Chevy BelAir, named Benito.

We toured a neighborhood on the outskirts of Havana, home to native Cuban artist Jose Rodriquez Fuster. He and his helpers have created a nieghborhood full of public art, called

Fusterlandia, by decorating the houses and walls with tiled murals.





From Havana, we traveled to the Vinales Valley for a visit to a farm. The owner Joseph Antonio, grows tobacco, coffee, yuca, and sweet potatoes, and also raises pigs and chickens. We were treated to an amazing lunch, with the food all grown on the farm—including barbecued pork! After lunch, Sr. Antonio talked about how he cures the tobacco for the cigars, and then he demonstrated how he rolls the cigars. Cuban cigars can not be brought in the US, but they can be smoked onsite! A couple of the cigar afficionados in our group said the cigars were the best they had ever had.

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We continued on our travels, stopping at Playa Larga, located at the Bahia de Cochinos, the infamous Bay of Pigs. Here we snorkeled in clear, warm water and enjoyed scenic beaches. We also snorkeled in a cenote, a natural sinkhole.

Wayne unluckily caught Covid right at the end of the trip, so we headed back to Havana and the rest of the group continued to Cojimar, the town that inspired Ernest Hemingway's novel, *The Old Man and the Sea*.

Despite getting sick, this was a great trip! The Cuban people are friendly to Americans, the private hostels are comfortable, and the food was outstanding--something we did not expect (although food for tourists is definitely better than the Cubans typically get, unfortunately). The island is beautiful, with typical tropical weather. We went in November, when the temperatures were moderate. Summer is probably best avoided due to the heat.

There are motorcycle tours offered in Cuba, but you must be sure that they are "US legal." Cuba is worthy of consideration for a trip, with or without a motorcycle, even though you cannot bring back cigars or rum. Coffee, though, is legal to bring back. And I learned how to make Cuba Libres!
